U.S. - México Border


- The U.S.-México border is 1,954 miles
- The Texas border is more than half of the U.S. – México border, stretching 1,254 miles from the Gulf of México to El Paso
- Joined by 28 international bridges and border crossings
- 4 Mexican states border Texas:
 - Chihuahua
 - Coahuila
 - Nuevo León
 - Tamaulipas
- 45 million people cross legally into Texas from México



 In 2022, border counties represented 21.2% of TB cases in Texas, although only 9.5% of the Texas population live in a border county




Texas Binational Tuberculosis (BNTB) Program Overview



BNTB Program

- Texas and México acknowledge that cities along the US-México border have a higher incidence of TB
- To reduce transmission along the Texas-Mexico border a formal partnership was established in 1991
- Four binational program sites in Texas oversee program activities of six clinics in México providing direct patient care
- Close collaboration: TB Unit, Regional/ Local Health Departments, FEMAP, Heartland Center, and México's public health

Eligibility for Services



Lives in México with relatives in the U.S.

Has dual residency in the U.S. and México

Has contacts on both sides of the border, in the U.S. and México

Started treatment in the U.S. but returned to live in México

Is referred from the U.S. for treatment to follow-up in México

TB Unit Support Services

Administrative

Oversee the performance of all Binational TB Programs

Program evaluation through Annual Progress Reports and Contract Monitoring Events Coordination and support for CDC permits, supplies, specimen transportation, etc.



Consultation services for TB disease and their contacts

Monitor nurse case management activities

Coordination of second-line TB medications

Develop and annual revision of the BNTB manual
